Community Shop Happy April! Finally, after what's felt like a long winter at times, Spring feels like it's in the air...

We'd like to start this month's update by thanking a couple of people:

- The first thank you is to the Highworth and District Lions for their £600 donation –
 we've used it to service our café equipment, to ensure we're always offering the
 highest quality service. We really appreciate your ongoing support.
- The second is to the Parish Council for installing a new dog waste bin in the car park, ensuring the one outside the shop can remain for litter only.

We've also recently celebrated our first anniversary since opening the new shop and café – can you believe a whole year has passed since our fantastic launch event and so much has happened during that time! On the day we shared some cupcakes with a few of our first customers through the door, as well as decorating with a number 1 balloon and bunting to mark the occasion. Check out our social media for the pictures.

From Monday 1 April, we'll be increasing some prices in the café to cover the costs of the minimum wage increases. Compared with another large coffee retailer's March 2024 pricing, we're still between 60p and 90p cheaper depending on the drink, plus by sticking with us, you're continuing to support a small business and feel part of our wonderful community. We're also running a promotion during April – if you spend a total of £10 or more in the shop (excluding café, cigarettes, alcohol and crafters products) you can get a hot drink on us. In terms of upcoming events, our next wine tasting, hosted by our supplier Oxford Wine, is taking place on Thurs 18th April at 7pm. Tickets are £25 and shareholders get 5% discount on any wine purchased on the night. If you're not currently a shareholder, but are interested in becoming one, pop into the shop for a form. They're £10 each and you can buy as many as you'd like. As a shareholder, you'll be invited to our annual AGM and receive regular newsletters containing important updates about the shop/ how it's running/ any changes we're planning to make.

We're continuing our series of Tea and Talks this month with a senior representative from local charity, Age UK Wiltshire, on Tues 23rd April. If you've ever been concerned about the welfare of an older person in your family or a neighbour, they'll be explaining how to access support through their Information and Advice team, as well as sharing more about the services they and other organisations offer across the County, including a daily meal service, local social opportunities and transport options.

On Tues 14th May, we'll hear from local resident Bill King, who's talk is "A Walk on the Thames Path – Part 1 – Source towards Oxford" which will be a slideshow presentation. And in June (exact date TBC), Larry Banda will be doing a talk to coincide with the 80th anniversary of D-Day. Alongside this, there's our usual Knit and Natter in the café every Thursday afternoon 2-4pm, social walking on the second and fourth Thursday of the month and there's also a social chess club that started in March, please contact Barry Burnstead on 01793 680675 if you're interested.

D-Day80



In 2024 the UK will commemorate the 80th anniversary of the Normandy Landings on 6 June 1944 with a series of

major commemorations and events across the UK and in France. Also known as **D-Day**, the historic operation saw the Allied Forces mount a large-scale invasion of Nazi-occupied France that ultimately

tipped the course of the Second World War in the Allies' favour.

The D-Day landings of 6 June 1944 was the largest seaborne invasion in history. Along with the associated airborne operations, it marked the beginning of the liberation of France and western Europe.

A Recipe from CookFoodFan

It was the Hash singing on the hob and slowly forming a crisp crust. The aroma of onions melting within, and the thought of a delicious brunch that reminded me that it was the weekend. The word "hash" comes from the French word "hacher" which means to chop. Basically, a hash is a combination of chopped meat/fish, potatoes, fried onions and herbs/spices and can be

made for any meal of the day.

The ingredients are usually fried until browned. A corned beef hash being the very popular comfort food in America.

Firstly, here's a recipe for a fish based one.

Smoked Salmon Hash (serves 4)

750g new potatoes, boiled until tender

1x bunch spring onions, thinly sliced

Small bunch dill, finely chopped (optional)

3tbsp capers (optional)

Zest of a lemon (optional)

2 tbsp oil

150g smoked salmon, chopped, or smoked salmon trimmings

4 eggs

Drizzle: 6tbsp soured cream (I used Greek yoghurt) and 1 tbsp Dijon mustard (I used wholegrain)

- Lightly crush the cooked potatoes with the onions, dill, capers and lemon zest. Season generously with black pepper.
- Fry the potato mix in the oil over a medium-high heat, stirring every few mins for 6-8min until a golden crust forms. Add the salmon, stir and cook for 5mins.
- Meanwhile mix the sour cream or Greek yoghurt with the mustard.
- Poach or fry the eggs.
- Divide the hash between 4 plates, top each with an egg and drizzle with the mustard dressing.

(I have put optional by some ingredients because I bought some reduced price smoked salmon to use that day and didn't have those ingredients. It still tasted delicious.)

A hash is also a great dish to use up leftovers in the fridge. Try these combinations:

- Sweet potato and streaky bacon.
- Herby sausages, leeks, potatoes and eggs.
- Chorizo, onion, potato and eggs.
- Leftover roasted vegetables, onion, potato and herbs.
- Sweet potato, chickpeas and chorizo OR
- Halloumi, spring onions, potato and paprika.

(Don't forget to cook potatoes before frying.)

The Chatterbox Praise Be!

Recently, I was one of a handful of entrants chosen for giving a particularly good contribution to a themed competition. There was no outright winner and no prize involved but mine was chosen as one of the six best entries. Winning anything is a rarity for me and I was absolutely thrilled to bits! That was until I looked closer and saw that my entry had been credited to somebody else. I wondered if I'd be making too much of a fuss if I asked for the mistake to be put right? In the grand scheme of things, with all the difficulties currently going on in the world, I know this small oversight pales into insignificance. Personal tragedies, global atrocities, heartbreaking news constantly bombards us. Something positive, however small, helps lighten what can very dark times.

In fairness to the person whose name appeared under my entry, they did speak up and say it wasn't their piece of work and the mistake was eventually rectified.

It did make me think, however, why this small thing mattered to me at all and quite a few things came to mind. I think most of us find receiving compliments quite an awkward experience. We're not really used to being given the attention or having our efforts recognised so pointedly. "Oh, it was nothing," is our usual response when we are praised, along with a casual shrug of the shoulders or dismissive flick of the hand. We tend to undermine ourselves and trivialise what we have achieved. Compliments seem to embarrass us and even the most heroic acts are played down with, "Anyone else would have done the same". Probably not, but we are modest and humble when the spotlight shines on us. What if we never receive praise or thanks for our efforts, though? Well, then we feel overlooked, taken for granted and that our efforts aren't good enough or worthy of praise. It's a bit of a tight rope.

Receiving an award, a compliment or a "thank you" should never be brushed aside in my humble opinion. If our children receive good marks or an award in a sport or a school test, we celebrate, encourage them and let them know how proud we are! Why should it be any different as an adult? In work situations, criticism is often given all too freely but thanks for a job well-done is often much slower to be bestowed. To get recognition sometimes requires us to go above and beyond expectations but one mistake, sadly, gets a much quicker reaction. Praise really does seem much harder to achieve. I'm not suggesting we wear neon flashing signs indicating our Best in Show prize or becoming so full of ourselves that we can't get our heads through the door, but I do feel we should allow ourselves to take that compliment, hear those words of praise, and receive that award without the need to add, "Really, it was nothing". It really WAS something; it was noticed, and you should feel mighty proud of yourself!

Moments where our actions, efforts and endeavors are noted and appreciated are precious. And if the right name isn't on the award, then ask nicely for it to sorted. We all need a bit of praise and likewise, if you see a chance to give it, do so. It really could make somebody's day a whole lot brighter.

Reading with Wine



Hello and happy Spring to you all!

I hope you all enjoyed some fabulous weather-based books in March; it would be nice now if the weather could catch up and realise it is supposed

to be Spring, a little bit more blue sky would be nice! I have read a good few books based in sunnier climates and it's made me crave some sunshine. Hopefully, we might see some brighter days when the clocks change, which leads me perfectly to this month's prompt; time. There are some great books out there that play with the parameters of time so you can be as creative as you want with this one- from frozen in time in Narnia with C.S. Lewis to as literal as A Brief History of Time from Stephen Hawking.

My first recommendation is 'The Time Traveler's Wife' by Audrey Niffeneger. Henry has a rare genetic order, called Chrono Impairment which means that he travels through time without choice. He meets Clare and they fall into complicated life of love. The story is told using alternating first person so you are always aware which character you are with at which time. We move with them between time periods, notably with Clare from the age of 6 to her 80's; this changing perspective means you really know her as a character. The storyline is a blend between science fiction, historical awareness and romance so it really does cover a span of genres. It is a beautiful story where the phrase right person, wrong time takes on a whole new meaning. There is also a film adaption staring Eric Bana and Rachel McAdams, a TV series and recently a musical version at the Appollo Theatre...I'll always argue that books are better, but this one does really work in any medium. It's clever, asks questions and somehow manages to be both heartwarming and heartbreaking at the same time.

My second recommendation this month is 'What Might have Been' from Holly Miller. It's a back-and-forth story with Sliding Doors vibes. We see two versions of Lucy's life based on one small decision to walk out of her job and not look back. Whilst there are similarities, there are a lot of differences which poses questions about life, our choices, and the timings of them; is the rest of our time governed by one or multiple decisions. I met the author and she said that she tried not to have a favourite outcome...I definitely did! I won't spoil it here because I don't want to give anything away but let me know on Instagram @reading_with_wine whether you are a Stay or Go fan!

As for the wine, I'm going to recommend the Piccini Memôro range- literally translated as memories and what else is time for, than to make memories. This range comes in Bianco, Rosato, and both a modern Rosso and a reserve Chianti. Their blends have been perfected over time by the Piccini family back in 1882 and only 7 hectares of land; today the fourth generation own four estates. They bring together the four distinct regions of Italy to represent the country as a whole. Morrisons currently have the Bianco, Rosato and Rosso on offer for 3 for £18; well worth it for a wine that tastes of luxury, and bottles that make a lovely gift too. Whether you prefer the crisp and fresh Bianco or a full berry glass of Rosato to the deep cherry and fig flavours of the Rosso, there really is an option for all....at any time!






Down Memory Lane



Villages and rural areas not immune to threat of child exploitation

I was astonished to learn recently that those criminal gangs who groom and exploit children and young people to carry out criminal activities on their behalf are now using virtual rewards to take advantage of them.

This takes the form of credit in online video games, so no longer must parents only be on the lookout for new trainers, designer clothes and expensive technology if they're worried their child is being exploited, but also online enticements such as avatars and virtual currency.

Children and young people are especially vulnerable to being exploited by criminal gangs because of their age and the harm caused to themselves, their families and their communities can be devastating with violent incidents often escalating.

That's why my office has backed the 'Check Your Children' campaign developed by Owen's World, a charity set up by family and friends following the death of Owen Dunn who was fatally stabbed in Swindon in December 2022.

Owen was carrying a knife at the time of the stabbing, and now his family are asking parents and guardians to look out for any signs that their children may be involved in knife or gang crime.

We've developed a video to explain the signs of exploitation, the reality of serious violence in Wiltshire and where they can seek further guidance and advice if they're concerned.

We often think of drug and knife crime happening in our city and bigger towns, but our villages and more rural areas are not immune from the threat of county lines and serious violence, and sadly nor are the children and young people that live there.

So, my plea to parents, guardians, grandparents, and other caregivers, please 'Check your Children' don't shy away from asking the difficult questions of your children and seeking support from schools, police, Crimestoppers and the NSPCC if you need it.


