
BLUSDON VILLAGE MAGAZINE

Parish Council News - February 2024

'...and February made me shiver...' it certainly has brought the frost. From the warmest and the wettest December/January to very cold mornings.

What should have been a new start for the improvement of the Borough's recycling performance has been fraught with many difficulties that we have all experienced. Although we have no control over how it is managed, the Parish Council has continued to give feedback to our Borough Ward Councillors who are directly involved in helping to resolve the problems as they arise. Please continue to report 'non-collections' on the SBC website, it will take them some time to recover but they will.

We have some apologies to make regarding the Village Hall. The situation with the boiler is that a major part of it has failed. It is just out of manufacturer guarantee and the Company who fitted it just over two years ago has ceased trading. We have no recourse with Ideal, the manufacturer, so its repair will cost us in the region of £5000.

BT have also taken some time to resolve the Wi-Fi issue in the Hall, but I am assured that it is now working.

We have had to take action to put in surveillance on the litter bin and dog bin at the top of High Street at Ermin Street. Someone is dumping rubbish in multiple bags at this location and it is now under investigation by Swindon Borough Council's investigation team. It costs you the tax payers £11 per bag to remove it safely. If you see anyone doing this, please let us know. Thank you.

Good News!

- ✓ We have installed a new light to illuminate the very dark car park at the Village Hall where the old shop was.
- ✓ We have laid a new path in the Cemetery where it was much worn, up to the War Memorial.
- ✓ A massive thank you to a Blunsdon resident, Mr Whiteside, who has done a magnificent job cleaning the children's play area in Linley Road.
- ✓ We have fitted a new defibrillator at the new Village Shop. (we now have 3 in the Parish Blunsdon House Hotel, the Village Hall and now the Shop)
- ✓ Our persistence with Swindon Highways has paid off and they have finally repaired the surface of Ermin Street around the chicane.

We have planned some more work along Ermin Street to try to improve road safety along its length from the bottom of Blunsdon Hill to the chicane.

Oliver Saunders who is working on the project, will be approaching residents along the road to find out their views on how we might change the landscaping to help slow down the traffic. Please help him out with your thoughts, thank you.

Linley Road Tennis Courts and Grassed Area

We have finally instructed our contractor to begin the first phase of the works to improve this area. It will involve creating a much-needed 12 space parking area outside the school gates, which will help ease the morning and evening congestion and provide extra parking for those using the Recreation Ground. They will also be creating a foundation for the office to manage the use of the Multi Use Games Area. The MUGA will follow in the second phase.

Hedges and Pavements

Now is a very good time to cut back your vegetation where it may overhang a public footpath or pavement. We have many residents who complain to us about the difficulty they are experiencing staying safe while walking along our pavements because the vegetation 'pushes' them into the road. Please take a look at yours and think about this safety aspect and please cut it back. Some of you have done it and I thank those that have.

FROM THE VICAR'S DESK



Into the Wilderness

As we come into February Lent is upon us, with Lent Lunches starting in St Leonard's on Tuesday 20th February and running for 5 weeks. Lent will take us from Ash Wednesday on the 14th of February through to Holy Week and Easter. For the church a season that grows in intensity as we join in the events that lead to the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. During Lent we mute our celebration. The seasonal colour is purple, the colour of preparation, repentance, and mourning. There are no flowers in church. No Gloria or Alleluias. We take time to reflect on our relationships with God, with each other, and with our world. We take stock of our faith and take a long hard look at our Christian believing and practising. We might give up something for Lent, going without favourite treats, or take something on that builds our faith through spiritual discipline.

In this season Jesus spends 40 days in the wilderness. Immediately following his baptism by John, the Holy Spirit drives him into a hostile, difficult environment where he is tested and tempted, being prepared for what's to come as he enters into his calling. Most people have some sort of wilderness experience in their lives. Being a Christian, being faithful to Jesus, does not protect us from difficult times and places. What is wilderness for you? Is it a place of grief, loneliness or isolation? Is it a place of addiction coupled with denial, guilt or self-loathing? Is it a place of competition, the need to be the biggest or the best, the longing for status? Is it a place of ageing? Is it a place of unemployment or the threat of redundancy? Is it financial loss? Is it the wilderness of leadership with difficult or impossible decisions to make? The wilderness is a place where one is at risk, endangered, frightened, vulnerable, lonely.

The good news is that the wilderness contains angels. We need to have our eyes open to these, as God's messengers, from time to time. A loving word or action, the care from a friend, the call from someone can make a difference to someone in the wilderness, enabling them to catch hold of hope and be strengthened. And we need to be those angels. Wilderness isn't restricted to Lent; we can find ourselves in it at any time and sometimes with little notice. Lent reminds us of the wilderness and encourages us to put down deep roots in Christ to prepare us for desert times. As with Jesus, we can use the wilderness place to strengthen our faith and trust in the one who loves us, provides for us and promises never to let us go.

Most of all, let us remember this Lent that Jesus is in the wilderness. He goes before us, is alongside us, behind us, and through his suffering and death has triumphed and saved us. Whatever happens, whatever wildernesses we endure, God, in Jesus, will be there.

Oscar, after getting to the top of a climbing wall said, "I was taken out of my comfort zone. My friends encouraged me to carry on climbing. Volunteer, Anne said, "The reasons we are opening an Explorer Unit is due to the increased retention at Scouts age (boys and girls aged 10 to 14). It's also due to young people who have not been involved in Scouts seeing what we do and the skills we learn and are asking to join." A Recipe from CookFoodFan

I love a recipe which becomes a regular, looks and smells tempting, but is also tasty and healthy. Also, it's a bonus if it is cooked in one pan and, even better if all the family likes it. As regular readers will know I collect recipes, torn from papers, magazines, found in library books or best recommended by a friend. This is a 'go to' recipes from my collection.

One-Pan Pesto Chicken and Veggies (Serves 4)

2 tbsp olive oil

500g chicken thighs, boneless and skinless, sliced into strips 35-40g sundried tomatoes, drained of oil and chopped 450g asparagus, ends trimmed and cut in half if large OR 450g French beans, ends trimmed and cut in half if large 65g basil pesto (I use green pesto from a jar) 150g cherry tomatoes, halved

- Heat a large frying or saute pan on a medium heat, add 2 tbsp olive oil. Season the chicken with salt and add to the pan with half the chopped sun-dried tomatoes.
- Cook everything on a medium heat for 5-10 minutes, turning a couple of times, until
 the chicken is cooked through. Remove the chicken and tomatoes from the pan,
 leaving any oil.
- Add the asparagus or beans, remaining half of the sun-dried tomatoes and cook on medium heat for 5-10mins until the asparagus or beans are cooked through.
- Add the chicken and tomatoes back into the pan with the pesto, stir to coat and reheat for 2-3 mins. Add the halved cherry tomatoes, mix well for a couple of minutes so it is all coated.
- Serve.

Tip: If you buy a jar of pesto, don't let it sit in your fridge to go off. I put mine (left in the jar) into the freezer and use it at a later date. Or you could portion it in an ice cube tray, then put the cubes in a freezer bag. Enjoy!



The Chatterbox What's Love Got to Do with It?



Readers of a certain age might remember the toe-curlingly awkward interview between the newly engaged Lady Diana Spencer and HRH Prince Charles back in 1981. Asked whether they were in love, Diana responded, demurely, "Of course," whilst Charles gave the decidedly unromantic, vague comment, "Whatever in love means." Looking

back now, I think it's plain to see the chasm of difference between them and their emotions.

In this month when card shops turn pink and flower shops turn red, it's a good time to ask what this word, "love", even means? Well, according to one definition I found, it is "an intense feeling of deep affection". On that, I agree. The ways in which it is demonstrated, however, reveal its meaning far clearer than words alone can. Love is present in so many relationships – a parent's love for a child, a man's love for a woman, the love between dear friends, and so on. From ensuring your child has warm clothes to wear, surprising a partner with a concert ticket for a favourite singer, to making a meal for an unwell parent, these actions speak louder than those three words ever can.

When it comes to romantic love, there's a strong possibility that it was Geoffrey Chaucer, better known for 'The Canterbury Tales', who first connected this emotion to St Valentine's Day when he wrote his 'Parliament of Fowls' around 1381. This poem, in which Chaucer claims "Seynt Valentynes day" is the day "whan every foul cometh ther to chese his make", consisted of some 700 lines and possibly relates to the courtship and marriage of Richard II and Princess Anne of Bohemia in 1382. Allegedly, there are at least two St Valentine's who met their fate on February 14th in different years but, until the time of writing of "Parliament of Fowls", St Valentine's Day had no connection to romance. After doing a bit of research, it seems the popular belief is that St Valentine was a Roman priest who was martyred during the persecution of Christians by Emperor Claudius II in about AD 270. Amongst various other things, he is listed as the patron saint of epileptics and beekeepers.

The earliest known Valentine's greeting is one from 1477 in the form of a letter from Margery to her beloved, John, and from 1500 they were commonly exchanged in Europe as the practice steadily grew and spread. The letters were later replaced by cards which were often religious in their form but over time, the sacred heart became a love heart and the accompanying angel appeared as Cupid. By the late 19th century, printed cards were more common and improved printing methods allowed mass production. Today, love is a massive industry!

Whether you buy your loved one a Valentine's Day card or not, I wish you not just a day, but a lifetime that's filled with love shared with your most precious people.

Oh, and chocolate! Chocolate is always nice to receive on Valentine's Day. I live in hope!

I have a couple of Reading with Wine ones for you to try if you are (somewhat belatedly) still looking for inspiration. Last year, my son and I completed the Alphabet challenge; we did it by title, but you can also choose to look at an alphabet of authors. We thoroughly enjoyed it and found ourselves reading

books that we wouldn't necessarily have done without the push of the challenge. My top tip is start with the hard letters, X and Z, for example and not leave them until the end of the year! Another popular one for this year is 24 in 24; it's as easy as that. You choose 24 books and must read them by the end of 2024. If you pick two from my suggestions every month, you'll get there! Which leads me to my challenge this year, I'm reading and drinking 'a year of prompts' and have decided to set the challenge to Blunsdon too so let me know what you chose for each prompt. This month, I'm keeping it simple, and the prompt is 'New Beginnings' You can choose any type of book or wine at all as long as it represents a new start in some way.

Book wise- I'm recommending 'The Start of Something New' by Miranda Dickinson. This is a heartwarming, cosy read that will make you believe in the goodness of people. It is the ideal way to go into a new year with hope, a hint of comedy and a delightful little boy that will melt your heart. Bethan is a single parent taking life one day at a time. She loves her little boy, Noah and her job at the local garden centre but worries a lot about their future. Lachlan is looking at a completely different life after a car accident leaves him unable to walk and therefore stay in his job in the army. Never having known anything different, he doesn't know what his future holds other than his pets, Bert and Ernie! Both need a life outside of their flats but maybe they should be looking a little bit closer to home. In a world of technology and dating apps this book takes us back to proper signs, messages and love notes and I for one, absolutely loved it!

Other options could be The House of New Beginnings by Lucy Diamond, New Beginnings by Fern Britton, How to be an Ex- Footballer by Peter Crouch, The Midnight Library from Matt Haig...Personally I've chosen Sister Stardust from Jane Green. I'm a long-time fan of hers so looking forward to starting this one.

In terms of a wine- maybe you did Dry January and if so, Well Done! Maybe you didn't and you can turn it into Try January instead? Here is a couple of 'new beginning' wines for you to look out for. New wines tend to be more affordable but perhaps more of a risk in terms of knowing what to look for; I'm here to help! If you spent 2023 drinking Sauvignon Blanc; this year, try a Picpoul. Asda do a great Picpoul de Pinet Blanc Sec for just £8.75. It's crisp and fresh with a demure lasting taste- a good start to the year that I think will be a favourite year long. If you like a red but nervous of anything other than a Cabernet Sauvignon...try a Touriga Nacional. In particular, the Loved and Found selection from Waitrose Cellar. From the grapes in the Algarve that make port, this combines floral notes with cocoa and spice and is a fail-safe bet for a new wine to try. And finally, if you want to toast but looking for something other than a Champagne; try a Crèmant. One of my favourites is the Specially Selected from Aldi for just £8.99. It's a perfect dupe for a well known double barrelled Champagne brand and a great place to start your 2024 wine adventure challenge.

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
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
